

## FRIGATE CONSTITUTION.

To all able-bodied and patriotic Seasupport its Cause:

The Prefident of the United States, having ordered the Captain and Commander of the good Frigate CONSTITUTION, of 44 guns, now riding in the harbor of Boston, to employ the most vigorous exertions to put said ship, as speedily as possible, in a situation to fail at the thortest command.

Notice is hereby given, That a HOUSE OF RENDEZVOUS is opened at the fign of the Federal Eagle, kept by Mrs. BROADERS, in Forc-fireet;—where ONE HUNDRED and FIFTY able Scamen, and NINETY-FIVE ordinary Seamen, will have an opportunity of entering into the fervice of their country for One Year, unless fooner discharged by the President of the United States.—To all able bodied Seamen, the sum of SEVENTEEN DOLLARS; and to all ORDINARY SEAMEN the sum of TEN DOLLARS per month, will be given; and two months advance will be paid by the Recruiting Officer, if necessary.

None will be allowed to enter this honorable fervice, but fuch as are well organized, healthy and robuft; and free from fcorbutic and confumptive affec-

A glorious opportunity now presents to the brave and hardy Seamen of New-England, to enter the service of their country—to avenge its wrongs—and to protect its rights on the ocean. Those brave Lads, are now invited to repair to the FLAGG of the CONSTITUTION now flying at the above rendezvous; where they shall be kindly received, hand-somely entertained, and may enter into immediate pay-SAMUEL NICHOLSON,

At the above rendezvous Lt. CLARK of the Marines, will enlift three Sargeants, three Corporals, one Armourer, one Drummer, one Fifer, and fifty privates to compose a company for the Ship CONSTITUTION. None can be inlisted who are not five feet, fix inches high.
